Dress The Part— It's a proven fact that the more into character you are the easier it will be for you to truly enjoy all the aspects of the night. In addition, it adds to the excitement, the photo opportunities, and your chance to be voted best dressed.

Review the Announcements—Included in this invite will be the castle announcements. Review this page for it includes background information (such as the other characters attending the party) that may come in useful the night of the party.

Use Your Money Creatively—Upon arrival, you will receive 10 gold coins to spend any way you choose. Bribery and blackmail are two of the most common uses we found (and highly encouraged). The wealthiest player at the end of the night will also receive an award for their ability to turn a profit.
